## Duration: 3 years full-time, 6 years part-time

- special educational and additional needs, which comprises three areas applied prevention in education, special educational needs and disabilities, and educational and counselling psychology.



# What Is Accreditation?

Accreditation is certification by a recognized agency that an educational institution has voluntarily gone through a review and examination by that agency. Accreditation gives public recognition to institutions that meet certain standards. It is a promise that the institution will provide the quality education it claims to offer. Accreditation assures the student that the institution:

- Is financially sound.
- Has approved programs of study, qualified instructors, adequate facilities and + equipment, and effective recruitment and admission policies.
- Advertises its courses truthfully.
- Some functions of accreditation (and accrediting agencies) include:
- 1. Verifying that an institution or program meets established standards.
- 2. Assisting institutions in determining the acceptability of transfer credits.
- 3. Involving faculty and staff in institutional evaluation and planning.
- 4. Helping determine institutions' eligibility for federal assistance.+

# LAW PhD

# Duration: 36 months full-time, 72 months part-time

### The minimum entry requirements are:

an Upper Second class honours degree with minimum grade averages of 65%(or overseas equivalent) in Law or a relevant discipline;

a master's degree at merit level with overall average marks of 65% in taught modules and a minimum mark of 65% in the dissertation/research element (or overseas equivalent) and no mark below 55%, in Law or a relevant discipline, plus prior research training at postgraduate level.

Studying a PhD with us means you'll have unique access to our broad portfolio of interdisciplinary research, and have opportunities to develop your knowledge and skills and enhance your research through interaction with major collaborative initiatives across the University, including our influential research centres:

- The Northampton Centre for Regulation, Governance and Public Law
- Northampton International Law Centre (NILC)
- Centre for Social Ethics and Policy (CSEP)

You'll be working on important research that shapes law, policy and social change through active engagement with policy-makers, legislators, NGOs and activists working in a broad range of disciplines and sectors.


### Coursework and assessment

For a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD), you must successfully complete a period of supervised research and training, the results of which show convincing evidence of your capacity to pursue research and scholarship, and to make an original contribution and substantial addition to knowledge.

Research training in legal methods: full-time PGRs are expected to attend at least 50% of the research training seminars over the course of the first year.

Part-time PGRs are required to attend a 25 percent minimum of seminars in their first year and another 25 percent in their second year. Second and third-year PhD candidates may return to take seminars they missed the previous year on an optional basis.

You must prepare a substantial thesis of up to 80,000 words, and also satisfy the examiners in an oral examination on the subject of the thesis. The subject is chosen by you, but must be approved by the School's Research Committee.



# **EDUCATIONAL AND CHILD PSYCHOLOGY** (D.ED.CH.PSYCHOL)

# **Duration: 3 years full-time**

Our Doctorate in Educational and Child Psychology is an initial professional training programme for educational psychologists, approved by the Health and Care Professions Council (HCPC).

You will undertake a practical placement as a central element of your programme, and will also complete five programme units to support your practical work:

- Communication and Interpersonal Effectiveness
- Consultation, assessment and intervention 1: Social, Organisational and Ecological Context
- Consultation, assessment and intervention 2: Child and Adolescent Development:
- Mental Health and Wellbeing
- Research in Educational and Child Psychology

Programme units vary from year to year. Above are examples of the topics planned for 2020.



# **COUNSELLING PSYCHOLOGY** (D.COUNCS.PSYCH)

# **Duration: 3 years full-time**

This is a professional doctorate, aimed at education professionals. These programmes will train you to doctorate level, helping you to gain the specialist knowledge to transform your career. The Professional Doctorate in Counselling Psychology (DCounsPsych) at The Northampton doctoral programme in counselling psychology offered by a Online Group university.

- Focus on the development of appropriate theoretical knowledge, research skills and therepeutic practice skills, as well as personal development.
- Learn a pluralistic approach to therapy, with a focus on humanistic counselling during the first year and cognitive behavioural therapy in the second.
- Work with staff who are active psychologists in the fields of both research and clinical practice in counselling psychology.

## Research interests of current staff include:

- Counselling psychology and social justice
- The interface between education and therapy
- Technologically mediated therapy
- Applied psychology education
- Reflexive therapeutic practice

You'll benefit from our excellent connections within the community of counselling psychology in the US, as well as strong local links with voluntary sector organisations working around mental health provision for disadvantaged and minoritised populations.

On completion, you will be eligible to apply for HCPC registration and USAP Fellow status.



# WHAT TO **EXPECT AS A POSTGRADUATE** RESEARCHER

uring your doctoral studies you'll develop an original piece of research on a topic of your choice, using a range of methods.

You'll take the lead on your project, but will also be supported by at least two supervisors, meeting around once a month to discuss your progress.

Our PhD community is home to a diverse and passionate group of researchers from nearly 100 different countries working in a range of disciplines. This brings a real sense of community, with individuals to look to for inspiration, friendship and support.

We encourage interdisciplinary working and the sharing of ideas, and you'll be respected and valued for your individual contributions, working in partnerships with our wider academic community.

There'll also be plenty of opportunities to get involved in activities, such as:

- workshops
- seminars
- conferences
- international research trips
- funded fieldwork
- regular opportunities to share your findings with your peers
- the chance to get hands-on teaching experience as a Graduate Teaching Assistant.

# FINDING YOUR SUPERVISOR

he relationship you'll have with your supervisors will be a key part of your PhD – they will develop your thinking, inspire you and encourage you.

## Things to consider:

- You'll have at least two supervisors to support you throughout your PhD, a main supervisor and co-supervisor.
- It's a close relationship, formed over at least three years, so you'll need to feel comfortable asking questions and sharing your thoughts and ideas.

- In order to develop your potential as a researcher, it's best to find a supervisor who works in your specific field, shares your research interests, and believes in your proposal.
- Get in touch with potential supervisors before you apply. Most supervisors will provide support and advice on developing your research proposal, which could increase your chances of securing funding.



# WRITING YOUR RESEARCH PROPOSAL

s part of your application you'll need to write a research proposal. This is the main way we can judge whether you have what it takes to excel as a doctoral candidate and for you to share your ideas and interests with us.

- Give your proposal the time and energy it deserves, and you'll give yourself the best chance to turn your idea into a realistic research project. The earlier you can start this, the better.
- Make sure you're aware of the context of your research and anything similar that's happening out there. But when it comes to your proposal, keep the literature focused and directly relevant to your project.
- Keep your proposal concise, and make sure your title is clear. Typical proposals tend to be around 1,500-2,000 words but do vary by programme, so make sure to check with your programme's admissions team or prospective supervisor.

- Include a work plan in for your research, with timelines and milestones. This will show assessors you're confident you can realistically achieve your research aims.
- Give your proposal a clear structure.
   We suggest: title, abstract, literature review, research questions, methods, work plan, conclusion, references
- Make sure your proposal is correctly referenced and your bibliography is comprehensive.
- You'll probably work through several versions before it's ready to submit so allow time for editing and proofreading as part of the process.
